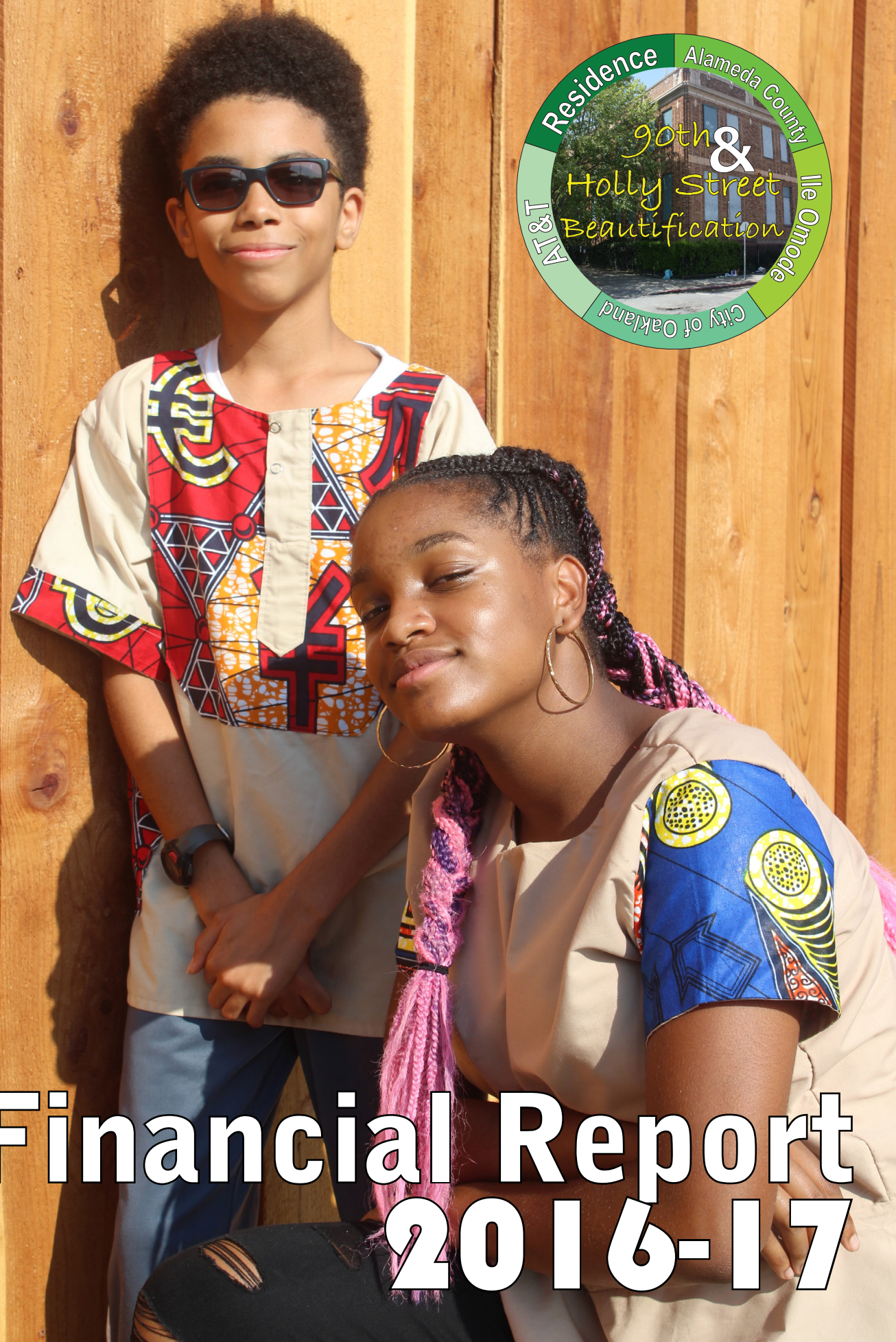

From the Director

One of my mothers, Bobbie Jackson, passed away somewhat unexpectedly just before our graduation ceremonies this year. Technically, she was my mother-in-law, but it was a term that we never used in our family. She had been battling a number of illnesses and ailments over the years, but she was sustained by

her unwavering faith in the Creator, a deep love for her family, and her life long passion - teaching.

We didn't have much in common, but teaching was a point of bonding. While my motivation to teach began as an outgrowth of a political ideology and a pursuit for nation building, eventually becoming love, hers was always rooted in love for teaching children.

Born in a small town in Mississippi in 1943, she viewed teaching through the same lens as most Black people of the time. Teaching was a hallowed profession; occupying the same celestial place as ministers, with some small space allotted for doctors. Teaching was less an occupation, and much more of a calling. And because she spent the better part of her career teaching at a Christian school, there was little separation between educating our young people to forge the next generation of doctors, lawyers, and engineers while at the same time ensuring they developed a relationship to God.

On one of the few occasions we were able to get her to walk, we went to a local park in her neighborhood, just a mile from USC in Los Angeles. She could barely walk 20 feet without bumping into one of her former students. Some were barely out of high school while others were at the park with their young family, but each face brightened when they saw her still towering silhouette in the park. She was naturally a reserved woman, and was rarely overly talkative, but from the lightness of her steps, it was clear that she was moved by these encounters.

In those moments it was clear that she took far less satisfaction in teaching these young people to master their letters, and far more in producing good people. People of character; people for whom the Creator would say, "job well done".

As custodian of this great institution I am honored by so many who have tested these waters, but my pantheon of greats must include "Mrs. Jackson". Through her I was able to witness the transformation of character that occurs through every lesson plan, and the righteousness inherent in this vocation.

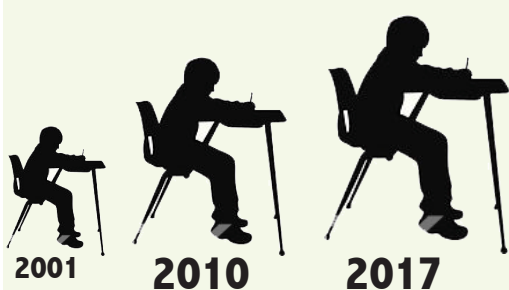
Ile Omode has served students from Oakland and surrounding cities for 30 years. Initially begun as a home-based day care serving preschool children, the independent private school continues to grow.

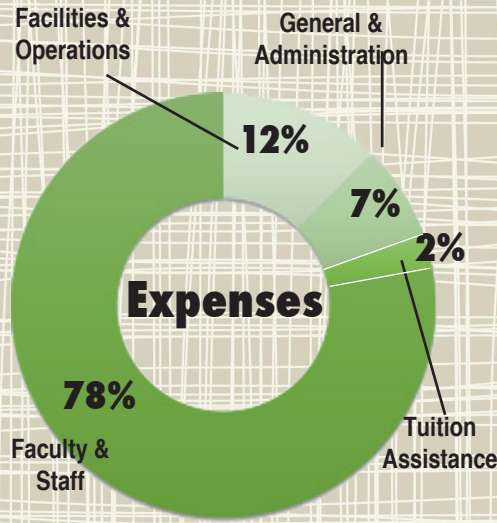
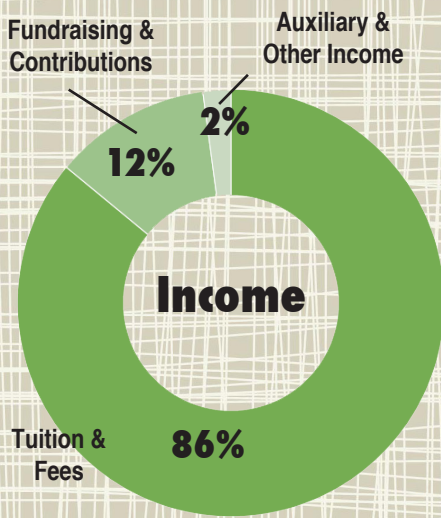

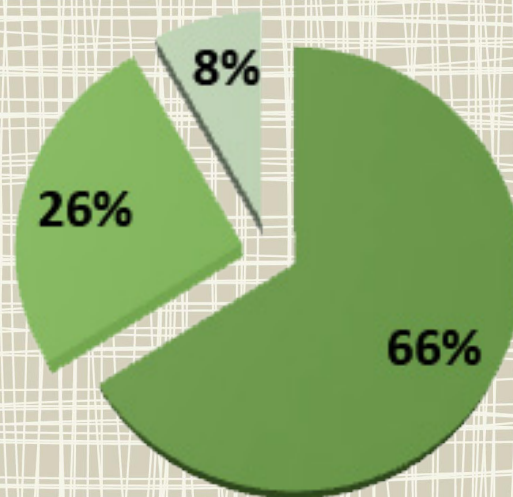

7th Graders Take on the SAT

The nationally administered college entrance exams, better known as the SAT or ACT, is a fraught exercise that can stress and overwhelm the most promising high school senior. But imagine the intimidation a student might feel if they're not even a senior, or better yet, not even a high school student.

In March, 2017, two of Ile Omode's finest, while just in the 7th grade, ventured to take the SAT. They settled in to the high school classroom where the test was administered, and took a moment to take in the older students that flanked them, clearly oblivious to the young test takers.

Selma Aparara and Neranti Gary, compelled by the prospects of a national scholarship, took the challenge and dug into the newly released SAT, which is considered even harder than the previous version. When the results were released just several weeks later, the two had finished above the 50th percentile, and had outperformed (one of them concluded it meant they were "smarter") half of the nation's college-bound high school seniors in the country.

For those familiar with the duo, the results weren't the least bit surprising. Selma is a multitasking prodigy, as adept on the dance floor at an Alvin Ailey dance camp (where she spent her summer) or in a Black Girls Code event, where she frequently is pressing for more "coding".

Neranti, like Selma, can't have his interests placed in a small box. The two of them perform in Ile Omode's jazz band, he on the traps and she on the piano. Neranti's real passion however, beyond science, is computer programming, and he spends his free time and summers developing 3D games and applications.

The two, who have been stand-out students since arriving at Ile Omode, have battled every year since 6th grader for the top spot each progress period. They have a 4.0 cumulative GPA, and have their sights set on the most competitive private schools in the area, but their real target are the top universities in the country.

However, after finishing the SAT in 7th grade, they are most certainly already on the radar of many admission directors.



For several years, Ile Omode hosted a very successful, "Casino Night" fundraiser each spring. Unfortunately, changes in California banned the fundraiser, and Mama Pamela, Ile Omode's business manager, along with a committee of parents sought to create a new spring fundraiser, and from the faces of this year's spring fundraiser participants, their retooling produced a great success.

This year's spring fundraiser was a Mardi Gras themed, masquerade ball hosted by Nikki Thomas, and guests leaped into the experience. The catered fundraiser, held at Oakland's Chabot Science and Space Center, saw all manner of exotic masks and full costumes.

The event included a silent auction, live music and a DJ, and guests were treated to the Center's unique amenities, including use of its several observatories, which made for wonderful viewing in the evening skies.

Childcare was also provided on-site, allowing adults to party like it was "1999". The event raised nearly \$14K, and the community is already looking forward to 2018's event.



Southern College Tour

100 STUDENTS! After escorting a record 25 students on a middle school college tour to Atlanta, Georgia and Tuskegee, Alabama in April, 2017, the school has now taken 100 students on our middle school college tours which began in 2009.

The week long trip is designed to introduce middle school students to colleges and universities, notably Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), as well as providing students a chance to see historical landmarks and bond with each other. Students for example, visited Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birth home and non-violent center, as well as enjoyed an evening at a local skating rink.

This was the third southern college tour, and students saw the usual HBCUs, including Morehouse College, Spelman College, and Clark-Atlanta University - where they met Ile Omode 2012 alum, Maia Morgan. Maia, in her first year at the university, shared her freshman experiences and reflections with the group.

Maia participated in the 2010 college tour, which was Ile Omode's 2nd southern tour, and it was at that time that she placed Clark-Atlanta

on her list of future colleges to consider.

However, this tour was the school's first time visiting Morris Brown College, whose marching band was featured prominently in the movie, "Drumline". Before visiting Atlanta many people assumed that Morris Brown College had closed after losing its accreditation, but a little research corrected this misconception, and the school's director, Baba Jahi Awakoaiye, made contact with Morris Brown's president, Dr. Stanley J. Pritchett, and the two arranged to meet.

Morris Brown has never closed, but the college had suffered considerable damage. A dorm was nearly

burned to the ground after local homeless people began occupying a building. Their stadium, which hosted events during the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, is fenced in and overgrown with vegetation and graffiti, and the administrators had to stave off prospectors who began ripping out plumbing to recycle the metal.

The school has only 50 students, but they are working to regain accreditation and rise again. In the spirit of helping our communities, middle school students decided to pool their trip money, and presented the college's president with a check for \$500.

Trips to Atlanta's Georgia State University and Georgia Tech Institute, as well as Tuskegee University were important, but the visit to Morris Brown was perhaps the highlight; nearly as great as the final night.

On the last evening the students enjoyed a semi-formal dinner and party at the Luv Lounge. The proprietor gave the school the entire lounge, and students savored an amazing Ethiopian spread and had their own DJ. Next stop: DC'2019.



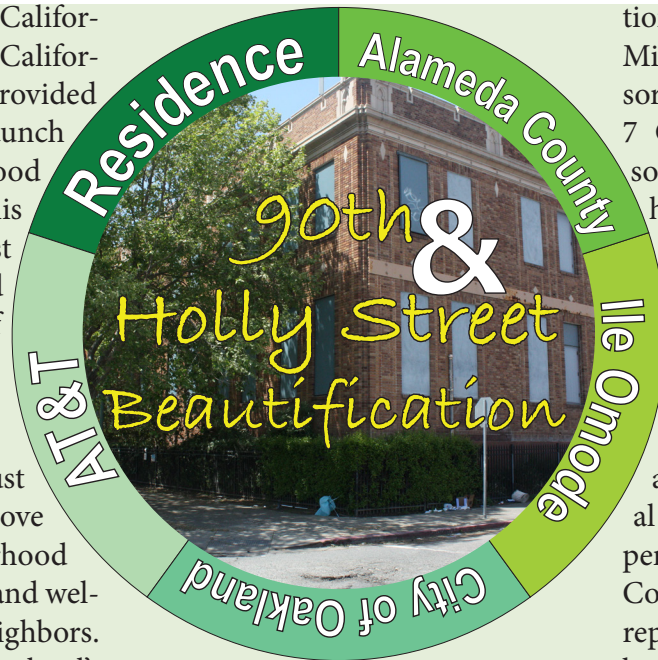

A generous grant from the California Endowment and the California Wellness Foundation provided the necessary funding to launch our school and neighborhood Beautification Project. This was one of the school's most ambitious projects, and marshaled the resources of the school's parents, and local community members.

We wanted to enhance not just the appearance, but improve the safety in the neighborhood while enhancing the health and welfare of students and our neighbors. Throughout the year, the school's call for action attracted scores of groups and people.

Parents, staff, and Wo'se members formed the Beautification Committee led by Mama Charemon Cooks, a parent, who served as the committee's project planner, and developed a multi-year plan.

The support for this project became clear at our first ever, Community Cleanup. Students and parents planned a one-day cleanup around our school, and received support from the City of Oakland, which provided tools and equipment for cleaning; as well as our Oakland City Councilman, Larry Reid, who immediately called out the City's waste



management to assist in removing debris and trash the students had collected. That effort attracted the local media and the students were featured in a KTVU news segment.

Baba Johwell Baptiste, a new parent this year, with a background in video production produced a wonderful video highlighting the day, which has garnered continued interest in our project.

Following the Community Cleanup, the school organized a Beautification Townhall Meeting in November, which attracted over 75 people, to discuss the challenges in the neighborhood, while offering solu-

tions. Led by a panel including Nate Miley, Alameda County Supervisor, Larry Reid, Oakland's District 7 Councilman, and Kirby Thomson, Vice-Chair of the Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council it foreshadowed a relationship that would continue to grow throughout the year.

Operating from a layout plan developed by Baba Tajai Massey, a parent, architecture and global artist, Ile Omode met with Supervisor Miley's Illegal Dumping Committee, the Oakland Police, and representative from AT&T towards building a broader partnership.

Some of the discussion has led to a proposal for AT&T to join Ile Omode and the City of Oakland in mounting license plate readers to track illegal dumpers.

The Beautification Committee is hardly done, and next year's plans include adding trees to the new fence, engraved plates to honor our graduating classes, a water fountain, enhanced play area, and an expanded and improved garden, along with a host of other additions.

After a start with much fanfare, it is wonderful to see the full work eclipsing even the loftiest ambitions.





WE BUILT A WALL

Well, actually a fence....and a shed, but as “our” leaders in Washington debate their wall project, we’re happy to extol our accomplishments, so it’s a wall. A big wall. A beautiful wall. Probably the best wall ever built, and no, our neighbors didn’t pay for the wall.

The Beautification Committee’s signature project this year was funded by two foundations and tremendous sweat equity from Ile Omode parents to build a fence with bench seating. The older fence was on the verge of collapsing and the neighbor’s dogs were a constant source of anxiety. The fence was built with a concrete base and built-in seating, and prevents any penetration, and the slightly taller fence provides greater security and is infinitely more attractive.

During the summer, Baba Marcus Gary, a multi-talented parent, drew up a design for a custom shed to replace our older shed, and provide housing for the garbage. He worked with a team of babas in the summer, often in 100 degree weather, to build the shed, and it is a work of art.

Preschool Ancestor’s Day



The Mama Jasiri Preschool staff organized its annual “Ancestor’s Day” celebration. Every morning the class begins the day with meditation and libation, with students picking ancestors to honor. The celebration is a chance for students to embody the spirit of historic ancestors in costume. Students, with assistance from their parents, actively were in spirit, and along with dress also shared speeches from the ancestors, which included Rosa Parks, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. , Dr. Charles Drew, Thurgood Marshall and others.

Basketball Program Grows



Ile Omode’s basketball program continues to grow. The school offered a single basketball team last year (middle school girls), and given the incredible demand for more and tremendous parent and staff support, the school introduced 3 more teams this year - middle school boys, and elementary teams for the boys and girls. Playing in the Oakland Parks and Recreation League, Ile Omode students continued to show improvement with several stirring last minute victories during the season. With only a single basketball court on the grounds, the coaching staff was incredibly creative in hosting weekly practices, and little Currys are blossoming.



This year, 3 of our high school alums, who are also classmates, secured California state titles in athletics. Class of 2014 graduates, Lonnie Turner, Khukheper Awakoaiye, and Tierra Robinson-Jones, earned championships for Bishop O’Dowd High School in Oakland, California.

In the fall, Lonnie (lineman) and Khukheper (cornerback), helped O’Dowd’s football team to an unprecedented championship run. They finished the season with a 9-1 record and league title, and stormed through the playoffs, dispatching 6 straight opponents, and along the way securing regional and Division III titles, with their closes victory against Rancho Cotate High School; a comeback victory secured on a field goal in the final seconds of the contest.

The team traveled to Moreno Valley (San Bernardino county) for the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Division 5AA state football championship, where they dominated in a victory on Saturday, December 17 against Valley View High School, 43 to 24, and joined McClymonds High School in the same

weekend, to become the first Oakland schools to ever win a football state title.

The two are poised for another run at a state title in their senior season, and they’re ranked high in early season polls.

While Lonnie and Khukheper collected their state rings, Tierra was just getting ready for the start of the 2017 track season. She finished the 2016 season as the top 400 meter runner in Northern California, and one of the strongest runners in the country. She picked up right where she left off, and her teammates



immediately knew she was ready

for the season.

At Clovis, California, site of the CIF State Track and Field championship, she improved from last year’s 4th place finish (while breaking an O’Dowd record) to finish with the silver medal in the event (and breaking her own record). She dropped her personal record by nearly a second, from last year’s 54.05 seconds to 53.24 seconds. And this year, she helped power O’Dowd’s relay teams.

Coached by Baba Jamal Cooks, one of Ile Omode’s parents, the 4x400 relay captured the North Coast title, and was expected to finish well, but was not favored to win the event. However, with a devastating 2nd leg by Tierra, which smashed the crowd of the state’s best 400 runners, she provided O’Dowd with a lead they would not relinquish, bringing Tierra her first state championship (and Cooks his first as an O’Dowd coach).

Tierra is the 3rd fastest high school junior in the country at 400 meters, and the favorite to capture the title at the state championship next year.

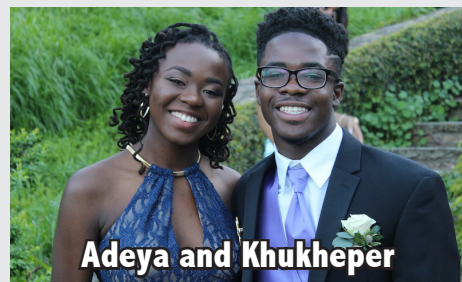

Her UCSB professors quickly knew they had a special student, and she was invited to enroll in a graduate course, where she was the only undergraduate in the course, yet received the highest grade in the class of Ph.D. candidates. Her research, focused on studying the impact of colonial missionary education on Black and African identity, was selected by the Undergraduate Research Colloquium SLAM Competition, where she was the youngest of 50 competitors.

Beyond the classroom, Zenzile served as the programming director for the Black Student Union, and concerned with UCSB's accessibility to underrepresented student, she completed a research project which led the university to implement an alert system to assist students in ensuring they complete their financial aid application.

Because of this work she was invited to present before the UC Regents (the governing body for all UC campuses) where she discussed the rising cost of attendance and barriers to admission.

She continues to credit Ile Omode with her success, and is a model of excellence.
